<u>Secret Files from World Wars to Cold War</u> is a new digital resource which provides 144,000 pages of primary content sourced from The National Archives U.K. Content which is only available elsewhere by visiting the National Archives in London.

Key aspects of the resource are:

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- Spans four major Twentieth-Century conflicts **Spanish Civil War, Second World War, Korean War and the early years of the Cold War** viewed from the largely missing until now, high-level British government and secret intelligence perspective.
- Provides digital access with **multiple search and filter options** to British government secret intelligence and foreign policy files dating from 1873 to 1953.
- Enables an almost **day-by-day**, **in-depth study of the Second World War** including Allied military operations, Axis movements, operations, and Allied defence strategies.
- Contains 9 file series including the substantial series HW 1 of intercepted, deciphered and translated original intelligence reports from German, Japanese, Italian, and other nations' signals and FO 1093 a major collection of files on intelligence, military operations, foreign policy, and defence concerns, in which information was gathered by covert means. - Allows for exploration and research across 10 themes:
 - o British Domestic Security
 - o Foreign Policy and International Relations
 - o Intelligence Funding and Finances
 - o Intelligence Gathering and Surveillance
 - o Intelligence Operations
 - o Intelligence Organisation and Administration
 - o Military Intelligence and Operations
 - o Propaganda, Censorship and Psychological Warfare
 - o Signals Intelligence and Code Breaking
 - o Weapons Technology and Nuclear Warfare
- Includes a **description of the content, themes, and topics discussed by each file series** provided by Dr. Stephen Twigge, Head of Modern Collections at The National Archives, U.K and **5 essays that contextualize the primary source material** and highlight key themes written by the projects editorial board.
